

Misses Stella and Lucy Harris, also of Franklin, came to Bowling Green, where they were joined by Mrs. Moody's cousins, Mrs. George A. Hobson and Mrs. Charles F. Taylor, and a schoolmate, Mrs. Granville Hollingsworth, for a visit to Mammoth Cave.

This trip was planned for the purpose of renewing memories of Mrs. Moody's marriage which took place in the bridal chamber of the cave. Nov. 12, 1879.

This was the double wedding of Mrs. Anna D. Moore and Mr. Thomas N. Moody, and Miss Jennie Lucas and Mr. J. W. Helm, and was the first wedding to take place in the cave.

The bridal party consisting of 32 people left Bowling Green in 15 buggies, arriving at the cave at 4 p. m., where they dined and dressed for the wedding. They took the short route, entering the Bridal chamber at 8 o'clock where the ceremony was performed by Rev. James I. McCormack of Auburn, Ky.

The second day they took the long route and dinner was served the party at noon in the cave's natural dining room, the food being carried down in baskets by the guides. The party returned to Bowling Green, the brides' home, on November 14.

On this return visit to the cave the present cave officials, after learning that Mrs. Moody had been the first bride married in the cave, extended her every courtesy, and requested her picture and a photostatic copy of the receipted hill for expenses of the bridal party of 1879.
