NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS AT WKU

The Office of Scholar Development (OSD) challenges students to dream big and assists them in making those dreams attainable. OSD staff members help students apply for nationally competitive scholarships by assisting students in finding opportunities to be engaged in their chosen fields beyond the classroom and aiding them in the process of finding the right programs, making important contacts, developing strong proposals, and revising numerous drafts.

The office works with students in all majors and degree programs. In the 2016-2017, OSD staff guidance enabled WKU students and recent graduates to secure over \$470,000 in external scholarship funding. Beyond the dollars and cents, national scholarships make it possible for students to study abroad, conduct research, complete undergraduate and graduate degrees, and change lives.

Although we do not yet have final data for the year, so far sixty-three WKU students and recent graduates have already gained recognition in national scholarship competitions. WKU was again named a top Fulbright-producing Institution by the Chronicle of Higher Education, our fourth consecutive time on the list and fifth time overall. Additionally, WKU was recognized as a top producer of Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarships, tying for twenty-sixth among large institutions nationally. WKU was also named to Gilman "Priority Achievements" lists for institutions with the most diversity in overseas destinations and for sending abroad the most first-generation college students, racial or ethnic minority students, and students studying in STEM fields.

Additional highlights include: WKU's first ever Harry S. Truman Scholar (Student Regent Andi Dahmer), a record number of Critical Language Scholarships (eleven and two alternates), thirteen Benjamin A. Gilman Scholarships (thus far), and our first ever Thomas R. Pickering Fellow.
