- Items needed for discussion today:
- Academic Policy 1.2000: Notice of Non-Renewal for Full-time non-eligible faculty. Policy requires notification in writing by December 15th, if faculty person in place for more than one year and is not going to be renewed. My understanding that some form of written notification (e-mail or letter) have been received by 5 instructors in Ogden College at this time.
 - Faculty Instructors Affected: Geology/Geography (2); Math (1); School of Engineering and Applied Sciences Engineering (1)/Computer Science (1). Likely there will be more notifications.
 - Made at the Dean level as part of a College allocated budget reduction resulting from cuts to academic affairs.

 - a. Budget Statement of Principle Funding Academics at WKU.pdf
 - b. WKU Faculty Senate Resolution on Prioritizing Academic Funding (Revised).pdf
 - Motion to accept Resolution and Statement: Motion Passed 41 to 5.
 - Guy Jordan announced the Resolution and Statement that came out of the Budget and Finance committee on the academic budget and the subsidies of athletics. The Resolution states that, "WKU shall for the 2020/2021 fiscal year use \$3,409,300 in operating funds that would otherwise be used to subsidize the Athletics Department to instead fund and effectively rescind scheduled cuts to Academics." This resolution is backed by the analysis and facts laid out in the Budget Statement of Principle Funding Academics at WKU.
 - A deep discussion resulted from the release of both the Statement and the Resolution. The conversation ranged from the income of athletics, if athletics make money for the Institution, the budget of the athletics department compared to other programs, athletics' role in student recruitment, the impact of sports/athletics on the institution/academic programs/local community, and the cost of athletics subsidies versus the academic cuts that are resulting in instructor layoffs.
 - There was also a conversation about how this should not come down to athletics versus
 academics but be about faculty coming together to across campus to promote higher
 education and develop a fair budget.

 - Tonja Miick (Substituting for Natasha Gerstenschlager) in the course of this discussion disclosed that she was one of the full time instructors let go in the academic budget cuts. She stated her opinion about her situation and the impact it was having on her relationship with Western. She also expressed her support of this resolution.

- 1. Michelle Trawick: Assurance of Student Learning
- This processes is needed to promote a culture of continuous improvement and there's a committee in place with representation from each College along with reps from CITL, QEP plan, and Colonnade committee. For SACs accreditation we need 18-19; 19-20 academic year Student learning reports.
- J. Shadoan: Based on CAPE and programs pending suspension do they have to report?
- M. Trawick: If the program was suspended via CAPE then there is no report needed. Those proposed to suspend in fall, do we have to include them? If there are low enrollment in those programs, and those programs will close very soon, there's no need to do those assessments.
- 2. Rheanna Plemons: Courseleaf, Workflow (Committee Reports)
 - R. Plemons spoke about the use of CourseLeaf in the creation of both an expedited
 workflow and a full-review workflow for items going through the Curriculum committee.
 A document of the workflow was handed out to senators and the development of this
 process was discussed as well. R. Plemons spoke about the possible implementation of
 CourseLeaf in other committees (It is already being used or piloted in Grad Council and
 UCC) and eventually adopted by all Senate committees.

 - U. Ziegler; Second F. Sunkin.
 - James Barker: propose to amend document to 2.3: strike word 'continuous' in the third line. Also, to strike the words 'to apply'. Think it should be easier to get Sabbatical not harder. G. Jordan Seconds Friendly Amendment.
 - A. Belt: It is extremely rare for those who apply for sabbaticals at the provost level to not be approved. The 'to apply' is so that sabbaticals come after tenure is awarded, instead of someone applying for sabbatical during their tenure year and receiving a sabbatical, but then being denied tenure.

 as posted and approved by the academic calendar committee, Council of Deans, and the
 President's cabinet. L. Bohuski; Second Hanley. <u>Motion Passes.</u>
- Motion to send to Academic Quality: D. Serafini, A. Jerome. Motion Passes.
- Current 2020-2021 academic calendar has J-term (winter term) starting the week immediately following finals. Class is in session for one week, then the University has a two week holiday, and then the term has another two weeks. Spring term begins the day final grades are due for winter term, the Tuesday immediately following the end of winter term. Calendar 'approved' by Academic calendar committee, Council of Deans, and the President's cabinet.
- Discussion of this topic included if there are faculty or student representation on any of these committees (there are), the effect of splitting the term on classes, study abroad, field work, and home work. K. Hudepohl asked if Academic Affairs had been asked why this was decided upon.
- Eventually revealed by Mark Robinson that this calendar was NOT the calendar approved by the Academic Calendar committee and was changed as it moved up the line.
- R. Plemons stated that this was not the calendar originally put forward. The registrar gave several options to Provost Ballman and all were put forward. The president wanted spring semester to start earlier, and this was the solution decided upon to also keep the winter term.

 - SEC met with rep of Grey and Associates where we learned a lot more about the process and the CPE. We have significant concerns about this and the resolution was put together by SEC.
 - Discussed: The type of firm that Grey and Associates are, their true purpose in aggregating data, the introduction of a high-stakes workshop in January, how much Administration knew about this processes and did not reveal, that different information was given to SEC than to a other's on campus (Helen Sterk and Ron Ramsing) later in the week, if the company knew about CAPE process or not, etc.

 - Discussion of the recent letters of non-renewal to full time faculty instructors. Instructors informed via e-mail and/or letter instead of face to face conversation, termination of colleagues who have worked at the institution 17+ years, the value WKU places (or not) on

- the work of the Instructors, what information was used for cuts if not class size, transparency from administration, and reversal of the non-renewals.

- M. Crowder: People notified by e-mail and not in a face to face meeting. (full-time permanent instructor) What I do at this institution is not valued at all. Saving these positions will take everyone in this room.

- ; Remove: "Selection" from the document; Change: "Non-continuance" to "Non-renewal." Friendly amendments accepted by U. Ziegler.

- Scholarship program: Changes made to try to change enrollment trajectory. This is a gamble, we'll have to see if it helps or hurts. Think of as win-win, students will have new scholarships and we would like to attract additional students we would not have otherwise.
 - They have collected data for each county that WKU pulls from and what is our market share, it's a data driven enrollment plan. Projection for next fall is that we will be behind, but the fall after we will have more institution revenue than otherwise. Much more comfortable with this than I was a month ago.
- Tomorrow's meeting there is a vote about keeping a transitional retirement option for those in Optional Retirement, they will have one-year option to go on a transitional plan. We cannot restore this for KTRS.
