Work arrangements approved through the Center for Career and Professional Development with instructor consultation. Supervised work experience related to a student's field of study or career goals within a cooperating business, industry, or agency. Students should work directly with the Center for Career and Professional Development and course instructor to identify goals, secure appropriate work experience, and review course requirements. Students are responsible for all internship-related transportation and travel. Students may repeat twice for a maximum of three total hours.

3. Proposed course catalog listing:

IDST 369. CAREER RELATED FIELD EXPERIENCE. (1-3) Prerequisites: Junior or senior standing with a declared major. Instructor permission is required. Supervised work experience related to a student's field of study or career goals with a cooperating business, industry, or agency. Course will include career-related learning activities and projects. Students are responsible for all internship-related transportation and travel. Students may repeat twice for a maximum of three total hours.

4. Rationale for revision of the course catalog listing:

Staff members of the Career Center administered IDST 369 prior to 2014. This was due to the limited number of students taking the course. Since 2014, IDST 369 has been taught by full-time faculty members. The old catalog description directed students to the Career Office, which has been confusing and problematic. The proposed change strikes the references to the Career Office.

- 1.7 Course description: Introduction to the film industry and aesthetics of cinematic visual storytelling, considered from both studio and independent practitioners' perspectives.

2. Rationale:

- 2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course: Many incoming film majors have little awareness of how the film industry works, from basic concepts like potential film industry jobs and careers to more advanced concepts like how films are ushered from concept to distribution. This course will introduce them to the mechanisms and structures of the film industry at both the studio (i.e. Hollywood) and independent level, deepening their view of the industry from that of an outsider to a practitioner. Many students also begin our program with no formal training in composition or the elements of cinematic visual storytelling. While some have innate talent in this area, many struggle throughout their college career with the elements of composition and other basic elements of filmmaking, like exposure and contrast ratios. This course will give students a common language and base-level of knowledge that will be utilized in production courses throughout the film major.
- 2.2 Projected enrollment in the proposed course: 30 per semester based on an average incoming freshman class of 60, divided across fall and spring semesters.
- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: Course will serve as pre-req to proposed FILM 202 (old FILM 101). Many concepts introduced in FILM 100 will be built on in FILM 202 and other film production courses. This course will also complement the introduction to style and aesthetics of cinema in FILM 201, and is designed to be taken in the same semester. SJB 101 covers a wide range of mass media topics, but does not focus specifically on the film industry.
- 2.4 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other departments: While other departments offer introductory courses to acquaint students to their area of study, HMD 171 Introduction to Management in the Hospitality Industry

- or IDFM 132 Perspective of Dress, for example, none focus specifically on the film industry. While composition and design is an essential tool of all visual arts, this course will teach visual storytelling techniques from a cinematic perspective.
- 2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions: Most universities, including our benchmarks, offer courses in video/media production. However, few of our benchmarks (BGSU, Ohio, Southern Mississippi, and Towson) offer film majors. Bowling Green State University offers the following course, which is closest to our proposed course: THFM 1710 Applied Aesthetics for the Moving Image. From the course description: "This course serves as an introduction to moving image aesthetics, tools, and techniques through the creation of original moving image work with an emphasis on achieving basic aesthetic and technical literacy." The course covers similar material in regards to visual cinematic storytelling and uses the same textbook, *Visual Story* by Bruce Block. This is a foundational required course for students in the Film Production major.

With the opportunity to complete coursework in a variety of disciplines, including English, broadcasting, theatre, and anthropology, the major features a strong interdisciplinary approach to the subject of cinema.

The major is composed of required courses in both film production and film theory and appreciation, culminating in a senior seminar. Students must earn a grade of "C" or better in all required courses applied to the film major. At least one half of the hours in the film major must be at the 300- or 400-level. CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

The major in film provides undergraduates a strong foundation in both film production and film studies. This combination allows students to gain the practical skills to succeed on a film set in both "below the line" and "above the line" roles, to experience the mechanics of film production in industry and independent settings, and to develop facility in critical and analytical thinking through the study of global film culture, history and aesthetics.

The major in film requires 42 semester hours. No course with a grade of "D" or below may be counted toward this major or fulfill prerequisite requirements for any major in the School of Journalism & Broadcasting. One-half of the hours in the film major must be at the 300- or 400-

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

The program revision will incorporate a new required production course, FILM 100 (Film Industry and Aesthetics). This course serves as an introductory lecture course to better prepare students for success in FILM 202 (formerly 101) Basic Film Production, as well as more advanced production courses. The course introduces key concepts about the film industry at large and the techniques used specifically by filmmakers in a cinematic medium.

- The inclusion of the new required course (FILM 100) will increase the total required hours from 39 to 42, keeping in line with most majors offered in the School of Journalism & Broadcasting.
- The pool of pre-admission courses directs students to courses they will be most successful in prior to their admittance in the Film major. Courses like FILM 282 Film Production Workshop I should be avoided until students have demonstrated academically they are prepared for the workloads required in such classes.
- The catalog description and admissions requirements were updated to better reflect current film curriculum and requirements and bring them more in-line with other School of Journalism & Broadcasting major catalog descriptions.

Due to recent changes in faculty and in courses being offered in other departments that are central to the major, the Core Categories are being reduced and rearranged to allow students greater flexibility in selecting courses while still ensuring that students study Popular Culture Studies from a range of courses that all focus on the topic from a specific disciplinary approach. Each category of courses also share a common broader theoretical approach to Popular Culture Studies. Reducing the number of core categories from four to three and adding SJB 310 to Category 2 and SUS 295 to Category 3 will also better ensure that a wider range of course offerings in all categories will be available each semester so that students can make timely advancement toward their degree. Elective course changes reflect the:

a. addition of a previously existing course with a clear pop culture component (FLK 275: Supernatural Folklore);

b. change in the numbering of a Folk Studies course that was previously offered as an elective in the Popular Culture Studies major (FLK 379: Special Topics: Foodways is now FLK 388: Foodways);

2. Rationale:

2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course:

CHEM 436 is a laboratory course designed to accompany CHEM 435. CHEM 435 is a 3-hour course that currently contains an embedded laboratory component. The embedded laboratory detracts from the amount of lecture material that can be covered in one semester. Creating the separate CHEM 436 laboratory course will enhance both the lecture and laboratory components of the experience, and will streamline the how the Department reports student laboratory hours for certification by the American Chemical Society.

2.2 Projected enrollment in the proposed course:

Five to ten students based on typical enrollments in CHEM 435. Only chemistry majors in the ACS-certified concentration would take this course.

2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department:

CHEM 436 will serve a laboratory co-requisite to accompany CHEM 435. There are no other existing CHEM courses that could fulfill this objective. CHEM 435 and CHEM 436 are not prerequisites for any other courses in the ACS-certified chemistry major; therefore, there is no impact on course sequencing.

2.4 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other departments:

There are no similar courses offered by other departments. CHEM 436 is a majors only course involving specialized equipment for chemical analysis. It is highly unlikely that another department will ever offer a similar course.

2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions:

Every institution that offers an ACS-certified chemistry degree must offer an indepth course in analytical chemistry that utilizes modern instrumental analysis. However, there is some variety in how different programs deliver this content. Some programs use an embedded laboratory while others a have separate laboratory course. The Department has elected to switch from the former to the latter approach.

3. Discussion of proposed course:

- 3.1 Schedule type: B
- 3.2 Learning Outcomes:

Students will gain an appreciation for modern instrumental methods of chemical analysis and be able to determine the most appropriate method for a given analysis. This will entail descriptions of the fundamentals instrumental components found in Spectrophotometric, Electrochemical and Chromatographic instrumentation. The student will also be expected to obtain a statistical understanding of acquiring signals and processing them.

3.3 Content outline:

Statistical factors in data acquisition and analysis Elementary electronics Spectroscopic methods of analysis Electrochemical methods of analysis Chromatographic methods of analysis

Students will be given a variety of samples to analyze by a variety of instrumental methods. The student will be able to compare and contrast outcomes of different analyses. A combination of short and formal lab reports will be required for grading. A formal presentation on a chosen instrumental technique not covered in lecture will also be required as part of the assigned grade.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

Background

The Department of Chemistry has undertaken a comprehensive review of its curriculum relative to a set of internally selected benchmark institutions:

Ball State University, California State University-Long Beach, Centre College, East Carolina University, East Tennessee State University, Eastern Kentucky University, Eastern Michigan University, Illinois State University, James Madison University, Middle Tennessee University, Montclair State University, University of North Carolina at Charlotte, University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Northern Arizona University, and Western Washington University

After careful consideration of many different factors, the Department proposes the following revisions that will strengthen its academic program.

ACS-Certified Major Concentration

The ACS-certified concentration exceeds the minimum of 48 credit hours required for a stand-alone major at WKU. A second major or minor is not necessary to complete the requirements for a baccalaureate degree; therefore, students that complete the ACS-certified concentration are not required to obtain a second major or minor.

The addition of CHEM 320 provides the ACS-certified concentration with a solid foundation-level experience in inorganic chemistry that will serve as a prerequisite for the required in-depth inorganic chemistry course CHEM 420. Several of our internally selected benchmark institutions also require both foundation-level and in-depth inorganic chemistry courses.

Registration preference in CHEM 330 is no longer given to rising sophomores and rising juniors, as additional lab space that will be available in the new building (Ogden College Hall) will no longer pose as much of a physical restriction on the number students we can take each term. The process for determining 'rising sophomore and rising junior' status is difficult with the number of AP/dual credit/etc. hours students have when they come to WKU. We were often preventing students in their second year at WKU from registering when they should have been because they already had junior or senior status by hours. This change will remove administrative burden from office staff in giving course overrides.

The addition of a new CHEM 436 laboratory course to accompany the CHEM 435 lecture course for the ACS-certified concentration will enhance students' exposure to indepth topics in analytical chemistry and instrumental analysis. The current program invokes a 3-hour lecture/lab model that includes two 55-minute lecture periods and a 4.5-hour laboratory per week. The two-course model allows for expanded discussion of topics in lecture and will further capitalize on the Department's instrumental analysis facilities. The prerequisities/corequisites for CHEM 435 are revised accordingly.

The pre/corequisites for the physical chemistry course sequence CHEM 450 and 452 are modified to reflect precisely which cognate courses in MATH and PHYS are needed for the specific topics covered in each CHEM course. CHEM 450 emphasizes chemical thermodynamics and kinetics, which requires students to have mastered the mathematical and physical concepts covered in MATH 136 and PHYS 231 or 255, respectively.

CHEM 452 emphasizes molecular quantum theory and statistical thermodynamics, which requires students to have mastered the mathematical and physical concepts covered in MATH 137 and PHYS 265 or 332. CHEM 320 includes some foundation-level material needed for the in-depth course CHEM 452 so CHEM 320 is added to the prerequisites for CHEM 452.

Allowing PHYS 231/232 and 332/233 to substitute for PHYS 255/256 and 265/266, respectively, enhances the ability of students to switch from the General Chemistry Major concentration to the ACS-certified concentration and still graduate in four years.

Chemistry Major with Teacher Certification Concentration

The program revision entails the addition of LTCY 421 to the Chemistry Major with Teacher Certification concentration in order to meet the new requirement for teacher certification set forth in 16 KAR 5:060, Literacy Preparation for Teachers of Middle and High School Students.

An introduction to remote sensing specific to the atmospheric sciences. Specific applications focus on synoptic and mesoscale phenomena, including large-scale kinematics and morphology, clouds, derived radar interpretation, precipitating systems, and precipitation measurement.

2. Rationale:

- 2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course:
 - Provide a dedicated course that focuses on the otherwise deficiently covered topics of remote sensing applications in meteorology. Further, skills and knowledge from this course are highly sought after by employers in the meteorological sector.

 - The department offers a fundamental course in remote sensing, but the dimension and applications as they relate to meteorology are not taught. The proposed course will provide balanced material complementary to that course.

 - There are no other courses at WKU that are similar or related to satellite/radar meteorology.
- 2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions:
 - Benchmark and/or regional institutions that offer B.S. Meteorology degrees traditionally offer a course in satellite/radar meteorology. These include Ball State University, Purdue University, University of Alabama-Huntsville, Western Illinois University, and Valparaiso University.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

The Department of Psychological Sciences recently created two new courses, PSYS 353 Psychology of Prejudice and PSYS 362 Behavioral Neuroscience with Lab. The proposed revision will incorporate these two courses into the Psychological Science major. PSY 422 is being removed from the developmental concentration because a recent change in the course to make it equivalent with FACS 422 has made it possible for course credentialing to fall outside the discipline of psychology.

The proposed quantitative psychology concentration will create new opportunities for students to gain advanced statistical training in the context of their major program courses. Students who complete this concentration will select PSYS concentration course so that they can tailor their experience toward their own interests in psychological science (e.g., development, social psychology, biobehavioral psychology, etc.) and thus be able to apply their advanced statistical training to projects that they are completing while at WKU. The computer science and statistics courses that the students complete will enhance their data management and analysis skills, possibly increasing a student's competitiveness for graduate study or employability in industry.

- A) The WKU English Department is in process of deleting ENG 390 (Masterpieces in American Literature) as a course offering. Due to the fact that ENG 390 is currently a course requirement for the Middle Level Education in Language Arts and Social Studies major (Concentration 1) and Single Area Teacher Certification in Middle Level Language Arts (Concentration 3), another 300 level ENG course is needed to replace ENG 390. Therefore, ENG 391 (Survey of American Literature I) or ENG 392 (Survey of American Literature II) is being proposed to replace the ENG 390 course requirement.
- B) The WKU English Department has changed ENG 304 to ENG 204. The change is in number only, not in content. The English Department states "the hope is that students will enroll in the course (ENG 204) earlier rather than later." This change impacts Single Area Teacher Certification in Middle Level Language Arts (Concentration 3).

- 15 hours from the following international business electives with at least three areas represented: ECON 380, ECON 385, ECON 386, ECON 496, ENT 425, FIN 436, MGT 316, MGT 390, MGT 413, MKT 324, MKT 491; any other courses approved by the chair of the Management Department

Proposed

The major requires 73 semester hours. The curriculum consists of:

- Required courses include: ACCT 200, ACCT 201, ECON 202, ECON 203, ECON 206, CIS 141, CIS 243, FIN 330, MKT 220, MGT 200, MGT 210, MGT 303, MGT 314, MGT 316, MGT 498 or ENT 496, MGT 313, MGT 305 or COMM 463, and MGT 499. Three hours must be selected as a cultural component from the following: CHIN 333, CHNF 430, COMM 463, FREN 323, GEOG 462, GEOG 465, GEOG 466, GEOG 467, GERM 333, ICSR 380, SOC 363, SOC 376, SPAN 372, or SPAN 373.
- 3 hours in foreign language must be selected from ARBC 102, CHIN 102, CHNF 102, FREN 102, GERM 102, JAPN 102, RUSS 102, SPAN 102 and another three hours from ARBC 201, CHIN 201, CHNF 201, FREN 201, GERM 201, JAPN 201, RUSS 201, SPAN 201.
- A three-hour study abroad or MGT 490 or MKT 491 is required.
- 12 hours from international business courses from one of the following tracks: **International Management, Global Supply** Chain, Global Entrepreneurship, or Global Trade and Economy. For International Management take twelve hours from: FIN 436, LEAD 450, MGT 305, MGT 383, MGT 413, MGT 495, or PS 350. For Global Supply Chain, take AMS 371, AMS 394, AMS 396, AMS 430, BI 310, MKT 324, or MKT 423. For Global Entrepreneurship take ENT 308, ENT 312, ENT 380, ENT 425, ENT 496, or MGT 390. For Global Trade and Economy take ECON 380, ECON 385, ECON 430, ECON 467, ECON 496, or PS 449.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

We compared required courses for the International Business Major with those of our Comparable Peer, Aspirant, and Competitive Benchmark Groups. Of those schools offering an International Business Major, we found that while our program is comparable in required hours for the degree, an update in structure is needed for better alignment in the academic marketplace.

Further, best practices include (1) an emphasis on cultural competence, (2) a deeper concentration in business disciplines such as International Management, International Entrepreneurship, and Trade and Economy; and (3) the integration of global business topics such as sustainable business and and global supply chain management.

Our changes create a common foundation for international business study and provide a more structured interdisciplinary academic experience than the previous design. The focused tracks better develop business and cultural competencies needed by business and industry. This approach offers better academic preparation for students with career aspirations in international business.

- 1.1 Course prefix (subject area) and number: FIN 300
- 1.2 Course title: Career Readiness in Finance
- 1.3 Abbreviated course title: Career Readiness in Finance (maximum of 30 characters or spaces)
- 1.4 Credit hours: 1 Variable credit: no
- 1.5 Grade type: Standard letter grade
- 1.6 Prerequisites: Completion of or current enrollment in FIN 330; Restrictions: junior standing and reference code 664P
- 1.7 Course description: Introduction to preparation for a career in Finance including exposure to careers in finance; certifications in the profession; development of professional writing skills, professional resumés and cover letters; oral communications; interviewing skills; goal setting; ethical standards; and professional networking. This course is limited to juniors and seniors in the Finance program. Assignments may include travel.

2. Rationale:

2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course: The department currently requires all graduating seniors to take FIN 499: Senior Assessment. FIN 499 includes coverage of topics in career development and readiness. The department believes emphasis on career development should more appropriately be required earlier in the program so that students have a longer period of time for personal skill development and to gain knowledge and foresight for securing jobs and internships. Career readiness skills would be introduced in this junior level course and reinforced throughout the remainder of a student's time in the program. Waiting until the last semester of study (FIN 499 must be taken in a student's final semester) to provide career readiness skills does not best serve student needs. Overall, making students better prepared and more aware earlier in their program should produce more productive, engaged members of the global society. Emphasizing interpersonal skills will result in a basis of understanding for lifelong learning and personal development. Understanding the impact and importance of classroom preparedness should foster academic excellence.

- 2.2 Projected enrollment in the proposed course: 35 to 40 students per semester. Nonmajors are not expected to enroll in this course. CFP[©] Financial Planning certificate students will be encouraged to take this course.
- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: Career readiness topics and activities are currently part of the curriculum in FIN 499, Senior Assessment. The primary focus of the Senior Assessment course, however, is to assess discipline knowledge prior to graduation. The proposed course is expected to be taken at the beginning of a student's junior year although students may fulfill the requirement at any time before graduation. Taking this course during the junior year allows reinforcement of readiness in subsequent classes.
- 2.4 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other departments: The Gordon Ford College of Business offers an interdisciplinary Certificate in Advanced Professionalism which focuses on competencies needed for career readiness and professional development for transitioning to the business field, including assessment, exploration and experiential components. The certificate is not required by any major. It is possible that this proposed course would make students aware of the certificate and feed students into pursuing the certificate.
- 2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions: A search of Benchmark institutions reveals no similar courses being offered. Career readiness services are provided through institutional Career Services departments, but student participation is elective. There do not appear to be any discipline-specific course offerings of this kind. No Kentucky universities offer a similar course. The University of Louisville requires all business majors complete a one-hour course, BA 201 Career Development. The course description follows: Prerequisite: Admission to College of Business, Sophomore Standing or permission of instructor. To introduce business students to career development, including the importance of career planning. Eastern Kentucky University requires students to complete a one-day zero credit Professional Skills seminar before graduation. The seminar is a pre-requisite for a 400 level zero credit course required for graduation.

1.1 Course prefix (subject area) and number: FIN 400

- 1.2 Course title: Personal Financial Planning Practice Management
- 1.3 Abbreviated course title: PFP Practice Management (maximum of 30 characters or spaces)
- 1.4 Credit hours: 2 Variable credit: no
- 1.5 Grade type: Standard letter grade
- 1.6 Corequisite: FIN 401 Prerequisites: Completion of or current enrollment in FIN 331, FIN 332, and FIN 444. Restricted to B.S. Finance (Financial Planning track) majors and Financial Planning Certificate enrollees.
- 1.7 Course description: Counseling and communication techniques, as well as interviewing strategies for use in financial planning settings. Introduction to regulatory compliance as applied to personal financial planning. Advanced coursework in professional software packages for financial planning and investment portfolio applications. Review of business models and staffing.

2. Rationale:

- 2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course: The Finance Department / Financial Planning Track teaches the learning objectives as required by the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards, Inc. In discussions with recent graduates and with potential employers of our graduates, the need for greater application of those concepts through the use of technology, which has increasingly revolutionized the preparation and delivery of financial plans, has become apparent. Technology has increasingly impacted the acquisition of data from clients, the planner-client collaboration in the design of financial plans, and the delivery and monitoring of financial planning recommendations. In addition, greater education is desired of our graduates as to the policies and procedures utilized to comply with applicable laws and regulations, given the increased scrutiny of financial planners by both federal and state regulators. The department believes that, given the technological revolution in financial services, greater personal skills development in these areas will enhance the education of our graduates and their attractiveness to employers. Overall, this course will make students better prepared for their careers, and should produce more productive, engaged members of the financial planning community.
- 2.2 Projected enrollment in the proposed course: Based on current enrollment in FIN 450 Financial Plan Development, and the number of declared Finance majors at present,

- enrollment is expected to be 20 to 35 students per semester. Students who are not enrolled in either the B.S. Finance (Financial Planning Track) or who have not declared for the Financial Planning Certificate program will not be permitted to enroll in this course. All students in the B.S. Finance (Financial Planning track), and all CFP[©] Financial Planning certificate students, will be required to take this course.
- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: The use of financial planning software is used, to a limited degree, in the FIN 444 Retirement Planning course, for purposes of a capital needs analysis. The FIN 450 Financial Plan Development course overviews the use of software, but financial planning software is not utilized to develop the major project in that course. However, client relationship management software, portfolio management software, rebalancing software, custodial interfaces, document management, and compliance policies and procedures are not taught in any course. Nor is financial planning software utilized in a collaborative mode with a hypothetical client.
- 2.4 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other departments:
 - The Gordon Ford College of Business offers an interdisciplinary Certificate in Advanced Professionalism which focuses on competencies needed for career readiness and professional development for transitioning to the business field, including assessment, exploration and experiential components. The certificate is not required by any majors. It is possible that this proposed course would make students aware of the certificate and feed students into pursuing the certificate.
- 2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions:
 - While the proposed course is not required by the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards, Inc., several leading university undergraduate programs require elements of the course as part of their curriculum. A search of benchmark institutions reveals similar courses being offered, including:
 - a) Texas Tech University offers three different 3-semester-credit courses that provide coverage of the content of this proposed course: (1) PFP 4380 Professional Technology in Personal Financial Planning; (2) PFP 3330 Communication and Counseling Skills for Financial Planners; and (3) PFP 2333 Legal and Regulatory Aspects of Personal Financial Planning. All three courses are required in their curriculum for Texas Tech's B.S. in Personal Financial Planning degree program.
 - b) The University of Georgia's undergraduate (B.S. Family and Consumer Counseling / financial planning track) program offers two different 3-semestercredit courses that provide coverage of the content of this course: (1) FHCE 3260 Computer Applications for Financial Planning; (2) FHCE 4250/6250 Practice Management in Financial Planning. Both courses are required as part of the curriculum.
 - c) Virginia Tech's undergraduate B.S. Finance (Certified Financial Planner Education Track) program offers two different 3-semester-credit courses that provide coverage of some of the content of this course: (1) AAEC 4124 (Client

Relationship Management) (required); and (2) AAEC 4114) Financial Planning Technology and Modeling (elective).

d) Purdue University's B.S. Financial Counseling and Planning program does not require any specific courses similar to this proposed course. However, Purdue does require CSR48000 Financial Counseling & Planning Internship (2-3 semester credits), during which internship often students would receive exposure to these issues.

No Kentucky universities offer a similar course.

Murray State offers a financial planning program within both its accounting and finance departments that leads to the requirements to sit for the CFP Exam, but no specific courses cover technology and practice management in that curriculum.

Bellarmine University offers an Executive Certificate in Financial Planning program but its courses are limited to the six core courses required by the CFP Board of Standards, Inc., and no courses are specific to the use of technology and practice management.

3. Discussion of proposed course:

3.1 Schedule type: C — Lecture/Lab. Experiential learning using various software in combination with case studies.

3.2 Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, Finance (Financial Planning Track) students should be able to

- Apply counseling and communication skills, including data gathering, through the use of software and interpersonal communications, to new client engagements and review and monitoring conferences
- Apply financial plan design and implementation skills, including through a collaborative effort with a client
- Apply knowledge of investments to the creation of investment accounts, their transfer, monitoring of a portfolio, and rebalancing and trading
- Assess the personnel requirements for delivery of financial planning services under different business models, as aided by technology.

3.3 Content outline:

- Client data gathering, including use of technology to assess risk tolerance, gather
 information on clients' goals, obtain investment portfolio information, and
 maintain updated information on clients in various formats and using various
 software and online technology solutions
- Development and delivery of financial planning recommendations, using both client-collaborative and linear methods, and monitoring of progress toward accomplishment of established goals and tasks.

- Investment securities trading, portfolio reporting, and portfolio rebalancing, as aided through the use of various technologies
- 3.4 Student expectations and requirements: This is an experiential course where students will be assessed by demonstrating effective application of the requirements identified throughout the course. Applications include but are not limited to: (1) undertaking data gathering including a risk assessment and organizing and presenting such data; (2) tracking information and tasks using client relationship management software; (3) establishment and maintenance of investment accounts and use of technology for trading, monitoring, and rebalancing; (4) design and implementation and presentation and monitoring of financial plan recommendations; (5) following legal and compliance requirements as case studies are undertaken through the use of such software.
- 3.5 Tentative texts and course materials: Course materials will consist of software training texts and videos, augmented with case studies (hypothetical clients), compliance policies and procedures utilized in actual financial planning firms, and recent industry articles exploring the use of technology in providing services to clients. No textbook is believed to exist that provides most of the desired coverage of this course. Software will be donated to the college. A computer lab will be utilized to provide instruction in this course.

- 1.4 Credit hours: 1 Variable credit: no
- 1.5 Grade type: Standard letter grade
- 1.6 Corequisite: FIN 400 Prerequisites: Completion of or current enrollment in FIN 331, FIN 332, and FIN 444. Restricted to B.S. Finance (Financial Planning track) majors and Financial Planning Certificate enrollees.
- 1.7 Course description: A laboratory course correlated with FIN 400 for financial planning majors emphasizing the use of professional software packages for financial planning and investment management.

2. Rationale:

- 2.1 Reason for developing the proposed course: The Finance Department / Financial Planning Track teaches the learning objectives as required by the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards, Inc. In discussions with recent graduates and with potential employers of our graduates, the need for greater application of those concepts through the use of technology, which has increasingly revolutionized the preparation and delivery of financial plans, has become apparent. Technology has increasingly impacted the acquisition of data from clients, the planner-client collaboration in the design of financial plans, and the delivery and monitoring of financial planning recommendations. In addition, greater education is desired of our graduates as to the policies and procedures utilized to comply with applicable laws and regulations, given the increased scrutiny of financial planners by both federal and state regulators. The department believes that, given the technological revolution in financial services, greater personal skills development in these areas will enhance the education of our graduates and their attractiveness to employers. Overall, this course, in combination with FIN 400 will make students better prepared for their careers, and should produce more productive, engaged members of the financial planning community.
- 2.2 Projected enrollment in the proposed course: Based on current enrollment in FIN 450 Financial Plan Development, and the number of declared Finance majors at present, enrollment is expected to be 20 to 35 students per semester. Students who are not enrolled in either the B.S. Finance (Financial Planning Track) or who have not declared for the Financial Planning Certificate program will not be permitted to enroll in this course. All students in the B.S. Finance (Financial Planning track), and all CFP® Financial Planning certificate students, will be required to take this course.

- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: The use of financial planning software is used, to a limited degree, in the FIN 444 Retirement Planning course, for purposes of a capital needs analysis. The FIN 450 Financial Plan Development course overviews the use of software, but financial planning software is not utilized to develop the major project in that course. However, client relationship management software, portfolio management software, rebalancing software, custodial interfaces, document management, and compliance policies and procedures are not taught in any course. Nor is financial planning software utilized in a collaborative mode with a hypothetical client.
- 2.4 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other departments:

The Gordon Ford College of Business offers an interdisciplinary Certificate in Advanced Professionalism which focuses on competencies needed for career readiness and professional development for transitioning to the business field, including assessment, exploration and experiential components. The certificate is not required by any majors. It is possible that this proposed course would make students aware of the certificate and feed students into pursuing the certificate.

2.5 Relationship of the proposed course to courses offered in other institutions:

While the proposed course is not required by the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards, Inc., several leading university undergraduate programs require elements of the course as part of their curriculum. A search of benchmark institutions reveals similar courses being offered, including:

- e) Texas Tech University offers three different 3-semester-credit courses that provide coverage of the content of this proposed course: (1) PFP 4380 Professional Technology in Personal Financial Planning; (2) PFP 3330 Communication and Counseling Skills for Financial Planners; and (3) PFP 2333 Legal and Regulatory Aspects of Personal Financial Planning. All three courses are required in their curriculum for Texas Tech's B.S. in Personal Financial Planning degree program.
- f) The University of Georgia's undergraduate (B.S. Family and Consumer Counseling / financial planning track) program offers two different 3-semester-credit courses that provide coverage of the content of this course: (1) FHCE 3260 Computer Applications for Financial Planning; (2) FHCE 4250/6250 Practice Management in Financial Planning. Both courses are required as part of the curriculum.
- g) Virginia Tech's undergraduate B.S. Finance (Certified Financial Planner Education Track) program offers two different 3-semester-credit courses that provide coverage of some of the content of this course: (1) AAEC 4124 (Client Relationship Management) (required); and (2) AAEC 4114) Financial Planning Technology and Modeling (elective).
- h) Purdue University's B.S. Financial Counseling and Planning program does not require any specific courses similar to this proposed course. However, Purdue does require CSR48000 Financial Counseling & Planning Internship (2-3 semester credits), during which internship often students would receive exposure to these issues.

No Kentucky universities offer a similar course.

Murray State offers a financial planning program within both its accounting and finance departments that leads to the requirements to sit for the CFP Exam, but no specific courses cover technology and practice management in that curriculum.

Bellarmine University offers an Executive Certificate in Financial Planning program but its courses are limited to the six core courses required by the CFP Board of Standards, Inc., and no courses are specific to the use of technology and practice management.

3. Discussion of proposed course:

- 3.1 Schedule type: C—Lecture/Lab: Combination of formal presentation and experimental study.
- 3.2 Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, Finance (Financial Planning Track) students should be able to

Identify situations that require consideration of compliance with various laws and regulations, and policies and procedures adopted thereunder

- Apply counseling and communication skills, including data gathering, through the use of software and interpersonal communications, to new client engagements and review and monitoring conferences
- Apply financial plan design and implementation skills, including through a collaborative effort with a client
- Apply knowledge of investments to the creation of investment accounts, their transfer, monitoring of a portfolio, and rebalancing and trading
- Assess the personnel requirements for delivery of financial planning services under different business models, as aided by technology.

3.3 Content outline:

- Client data gathering, including use of technology to assess risk tolerance, gather
 information on clients' goals, obtain investment portfolio information, and
 maintain updated information on clients in various formats and using various
 software and online technology solutions
- Development and delivery of financial planning recommendations, using both client-collaborative and linear methods, and monitoring of progress toward accomplishment of established goals and tasks.
- Legal and regulatory requirements applicable to the acquisition of new clients and the provision of services to clients, including a review of typical compliance policies and procedures, and restrictions upon conduct
- Investment securities trading, portfolio reporting, and portfolio rebalancing, as aided through the use of various technologies

- 3.4 Student expectations and requirements: This is an experiential course where students will be assessed by demonstrating effective application of the requirements identified throughout the course. Applications include but are not limited to: (1) undertaking data gathering including a risk assessment and organizing and presenting such data; (2) tracking information and tasks using client relationship management software; (3) establishment and maintenance of investment accounts and use of technology for trading, monitoring, and rebalancing; (4) design and implementation and presentation and monitoring of financial plan recommendations; (5) reviewing legal and compliance requirements, and applying those requirements through testing using hypotheticals.
- 3.5 Tentative texts and course materials: Course materials will consist of software training texts and videos, augmented with case studies (hypothetical clients), compliance policies and procedures utilized in actual financial planning firms, and recent industry articles exploring the use of technology in providing services to clients. No textbook is believed to exist that provides most of the desired coverage of this course. Software will be donated to the college. A computer lab will be utilized to provide instruction in this course.

This course allows health students to work within an electronic health record prior to graduating and working in health care settings.

With the need for curriculum changes to increase healthcare analytics and electronic health record application courses, two other management courses, HCA 342 Human Resources and HCA 401 Healthcare Financial Management, are being deleted from HIM curriculum. The new HIM 421 course will include basic human resource management and financial management topics along with leadership and management of health information management systems.

- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: Currently HIM baccalaureate students take HCA 340- Health Care Organization and Management, HCA 342- Human Resources Management for Healthcare Managers and HCA 401 Fundamentals of Health Care Financial Management. Due to the mandated curriculum changes from CAHIIM in fall 2017 it is necessary to delete these three courses from the HIM Program to make room for additional HIM courses. By doing this it creates the need for a new HIM course that combines some of the content originally obtained through the three HCA courses. The HIM 421 course focuses on not only general management practices but also on these specific needs related to Health Information Management. In addition to the HCA courses there is a lower level course, HIM 221 Health Information and Quality Management that touches on management applications.

- 2.3 Relationship of the proposed course to courses now offered by the department: HIM 230 Computer Systems and Applications in Health Information Management is an associate degree course that offers the students a broad overview and hands-on instruction of software and computer applications within healthcare for the Health Information Management professional. HCA 446 Healthcare Informatics and HCA 447 Information Systems Lab offers a broad overview of information software and hands-on instruction in using basic software.

 Maintaining the LPN to ASN option, while transitioning away from the traditional ASN option, will allow for potential growth in the baccalaureate

- nursing program to help fulfill the needs of both the community and students, while contributing to the Institute of Medicine target goal of increasing the proportion of registered nurses with a baccalaureate degree to 80%.
- The proposed change in minimum credit hours from 69 to 61 credit hours will continue to meet the minimum requirement for an associate degree as requested by the CPE for all Kentucky public universities. The proposed 61 credit hours will not sacrifice the quality of the Associate of Science in Nursing (ASN) program or the qualifications for the graduates to successfully complete the required licensure examination while bringing the program more in line with CPE recommendation of 60 credit hour associate degree program.

Removal of chemistry from the ASN program maintains colonnade requirements for an associate degree program and will allow students flexibility when selecting the second natural science colonnade requirement for a future baccalaureate degree.
- BIOL 207 Microbiology was moved from third to second semester in the curriculum plan to allow students an additional semester to apply knowledge learned in microbiology to nursing classroom/clinical experiences and to evenly disperse credit hours across the program.
- SOCL 100 Introductory Sociology is not a standard course for associate degree nursing programs and students can be successful in nursing without having an introductory sociology course. As sociology is not required by other nursing programs, this revision increases program competitiveness. Sociology has already been removed from the WKU RN to BSN program. Removal of sociology from the ASN program continues to meet the social and behavioral colonnade requirement for an associate degree program and a future baccalaureate degree.
- Revision of the math listing allows for any math course meeting Quantitative Reasoning colonnade requirement simplifying the transfer evaluation process.
 This provides consistency with the math requirements for the WKU BSN

program. In addition, the revision continues to meet the quantitative reasoning colonnade requirement for an associate degree and a future baccalaureate degree.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

• Three new courses (HIM 330, HIM 421, and HIM 430) will be added to the program in order to meet the new HIM accrediting body (CAHIIM) curriculum requirements for Fall 2017 and allow for more in depth topics in the HIM field. Curriculum changes are in response to the healthcare industry needs for healthcare data analytics professionals. Healthcare is becoming increasingly data driven. Increased education will allow for more job opportunities for graduates.

In addition, currently an associate degree from a CAHIIM accredited program is required for admission to the baccalaureate program. Adding seven existing courses from the associate degree program to the baccalaureate program will allow students without a pre-existing HIM CAHIIM accredited associate degree to enter into the baccalaureate program. This will increase enrollment. (Currently only three KCTCS associate degree programs are CAHIIM accredited so most KCTCS graduates who want in the baccalaureate program cannot be admitted.)

- Two courses (HCA 342 and HCA 401) are being deleted from the program in order to fit in the newly developed course curriculum required for CAHIIM accreditation. This will allow total credit hours to be as close to 120 credit hours as possible. Necessary content from HCA 342 and HCA 401 for HIM BS students was added to the HIM 421 course.
- Proposed revisions in the program will:

- Allow more students to be eligible to apply to the HIM B.S. program by modifying admission requirements and increasing credit hours.
- o Allow Program Description to be in line with the modified admission requirements.
- Allow students more options on course choices, which will help with scheduling and allow students to choose to take classes completely online or take some classes face-toface.
- o Provide the student the flexibility of taking computer information technology courses, business informatics/analytics courses, or a combination of the two depending on the interest of the student through adding course options under the restricted electives.
- o Allow the program the ability to meet CAHIIM accreditation requirements for competency skills by moving HIM courses from electives to required courses.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

The program is being updated in the following ways for the following reasons:

FACS Education Concentration:

- The FACS Education advisory board that met July 2016 reviewed the current program and identified a major weakness in the program as limited depth in content which makes it difficult for students to be completely comfortable with content when they start their teaching career. FACS Education is a comprehensive degree and students do not know during their pre-service preparation what subjects they might teach when they are first hired, much less later in their career; students must prepare to teach content in a wide variety of subject matters. They may be asked to teach any of 35 different courses at either the middle school or high school level; most will teach a combination of different courses each semester. The advisory board was unanimous in their recommendation that place be found in the curriculum for additional electives to allow students to have more depth in at least one or more content areas. This change will allow students to select two electives from an identified list, allowing them more depth in the fields of culinary, child development, hospitality, youth organizations and leadership, apparel and textiles, and sexuality (a major component of some courses).
- A survey was sent to all program graduates since 2010 that are currently teaching family and consumer sciences in either Kentucky or Tennessee. It was also administered to students in the FACS 481 class (capstone course) and the student that is currently student teaching. There was a 73% return rate on the surveys. All indicated a need for an increased content knowledge base prior to graduation and indicated that the areas they most needed more depth in were child development and culinary, specifically having the ServSafe certification since these are currently the most popular pathways in Kentucky. More recent graduates and current seniors all indicated a preference for dropping CIS 141, SEC 351, and SEC 352.
- SEC 351 and 352 will be dropped. The School of Teacher Education has recently changed the way the SEC 351 and 352 courses are taught and anticipates making additional changes to those courses, only offering them once per year and during the same semester. This will be difficult for the FACS Education students, necessitating 88 hours of observation during one semester in addition to requirements in other classes. Since the School of Teacher Education has changed the focus of how the SEC 351 and 352 courses are taught, there has been a great deal of inconsistency in the teaching of these two classes. Few other programs preparing either K-12 or 5-12 teachers at WKU require students to complete these courses. Recent graduates indicated that the content from these courses could either be eliminated or included in other courses to better meet their needs. The observation hours (at total of 88) will be distributed between the FACS 282, 381, and 481 classes.
- CIS 141 will be dropped. While earlier graduates felt they benefitted from this course, more recent graduates indicated that they already had the majority of the skills and knowledge presented in the class. Students come to college more computer literate than when this course was first added to the program. Both the advisory committee and current/recent graduates indicated it should be dropped. Few, if any, other programs preparing either K-12 or 5-12 teachers at WKU require students to complete this course.
- FACS 180, an introduction to all family and consumer sciences careers, is being replaced with FACS 282. This will better meet the needs of students as it will start them with observation opportunities, lesson planning and presentation, and resource development toward future teaching experiences. Students will be required to take the Praxis Core

- Academic Skills for Educators at least once during this course to help ensure their timely completion of this requirement for admission to teacher education. Making this change will also benefit students who change their major later in their university experience as it will better serve the needs of this population than the FACS 180 currently does.
- FACS 492 is not currently being taught. It was a second course in child development. FACS 422 will expand child and human development to the adolescent age group, which is more appropriate for those students that will be teaching in middle grades and high school. This will assist future teachers as they develop lesson plans and activities geared to adolescents and strive to understand the developmental processes these students are working through.
- FACS 312 will replace the SEC 352 course. SEC 352 focused on diversity. This, based on student feedback, generally dealt with special needs students and several expressed the opinion that since SPED 330 was added to the program, there was some duplication. A major factor when dealing with diverse students of all types is doing so in an ethical manner. The addition of the ethics course will help future teachers more firmly grasp the varied responsibilities of ethical professionalism, including the code of ethics they must agree to as future FCS teachers in Kentucky.
- CIS 141 and SEC 351 will be replaced by two electives selected by the student in
 consultation with their advisor. The electives students may choose from include HMD
 151 and 251 (taken concurrently), HMD 171, FACS 192, FACS 495, AGED 300, IDFM
 132, IDFM 431, and PH 365. Students may select other electives after consultation and
 with approval of their advisor.

Family Studies Concentration:

- After a thorough review of the curriculum, it was determined that the majority of the content of FACS 492 was duplicated in numerous courses throughout the major, many of which are taken in sequence before FACS 492. Instead, students will now take FACS 422 (Adolescent Psychology) to fill a gap in the human development portion of the curriculum. The content of FACS 422 is important for students who may end up in career positions working with adolescents and their families.
- SOCL 300 has been used as a prerequisite for FACS 399 (Implications of Research in FCS). A
 review of the curriculum revealed that the content in SOCL 300 needed to be successful in FACS
 399 was also being taught during the early portions of the FACS 399 course. Students will now
 take FACS 312 as a required major course. The review of program curriculum indicated the need
 for a course based on ethics and professionalism specific to the family life professions. FACS 312
 will also allow students to better prepare to become Certified Family Life Educators, should they
 choose to do so.
- The content of PSYS 430 OR SOCL 355 OR SOCL 366 are now incorporated into a variety of courses that FACS students currently take (e.g., FACS 191, FACS 310, FACS 311, FACS 494, FACS 495). When the family studies major concentration was originally created, this portion of the curriculum was designed to focus on gender in the context of families. As the family studies curriculum evolved, the topic of gender and families has been incorporated into a number of required major courses. Instead, students will now have an option to choose an approved upper-division elective, allowing them some flexibility in their major concentration.

• The family studies major concentration includes the choice of a FACS upper-level elective. The only courses that are accepted as electives are FACS 395, FACS 497, and PH 444. An academic advisor may also approve an elective, but this should only happen in rare situations.

Child Studies Concentration:

- After a thorough review of the curriculum, it was determined that the majority of the content of FACS 492 was duplicated in numerous courses throughout the major, many of which are taken in sequence before FACS 492. Instead, students can now take either FACS 393 or FACS 496, either of which will enhance student's learning about child development and working with children.
- SOCL 300 has been used as a prerequisite for FACS 399 (Implications of Research in FCS). A review of the curriculum revealed that the content in SOCL 300 needed to be successful in FACS 399 was also being taught during the early portions of the FACS 399 course. Students will now take FACS 312 as a required major course. The review of program curriculum indicated the need for a course based on ethics and professionalism specific to the family life professions. FACS 312 will also allow students to better prepare to become Certified Family Life Educators, should they choose to do so.
- The child studies major concentration includes the choice of a FACS upper-level elective. Previously, no list of approved electives was approved through the curriculum process. Subsequently, unapproved courses are displayed on students' iCAP audit reports. To correct students from completing unapproved electives, the only courses that are accepted as electives are FACS 391, FACS 395, FACS 410, FACS 422, FACS 495, and FACS 497. An academic advisor may also approve an elective, but this should only happen in rare situations.
