Musicians are often required to be their own business manager, marketer, social media expert, financial advisor, and career counselor. While these obstacles can seem overwhelming, with the proper tools and resources students can turn these looming challenges into creative opportunities. This course will not only require students to develop practical skills such as building a website and putting together a CV, but will also encourage them to reflect on their musical interests, find their own artistic identities, and build interpersonal skills that will help them achieve their career goals. The department of music currently does not offer a course that addresses all of these topics.

This course is organized around the notion that to understand the systems in which administrators work and to apply the skills of public administration, it is essential to comprehend the dynamics and the context of public administration in a constitutional democracy. As implementers of public policy, public administrators play an important role in maintaining the relationship between citizens and the state.

The fit between public administration and democracy has never been comfortable. The quest for efficient and effective administration of public programs takes place in an environment characterized by lively deliberations over policy objectives, clashing philosophies, citizen participation, the role of equity, and demands for accountability. This course provides an overview of the approaches to public administration that have developed over roughly the last century in the United States. As efforts to reconcile public administration with democratic processes have evolved, so too have the skills of administrators and the systems within which they work.

- **3.2** Learning Outcomes: "Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:"
 - Identify and explain the theoretical foundations of the field of public administration.
 - Describe and explain the nature and development of public administration as an academic discipline and field of practice in the United States.
 - Analyze competing conceptual frames of public service in the United States.

4. Rationale

- Reducing required hours in the studio and graphic design concentrations aids in timely matriculation through the program, in line with current Commonwealth and University goals, and better matches our benchmark and regional competitor institutions, thus increasing attractiveness of our program to students.
- The department emphasizes drawing more than most programs, therefore editing ART 440 Drawing is not detrimental to our majors.
- A reduction of upper level hours within the BFA studio emphasis will increase the efficacy of our program by cleaning up structural duplication and clarifying consistent expectations. Currently students typically "double-up" on upper level courses three times within the program (taken simultaneously), making the perceived objective about numbers over experience. Shifting to doubling-up only once, in their final semester as they near graduation and their thesis exhibitions, will emphasize and maximize student focus. Overall, this reduction in course hours will improve the quality of our program and enhance our primary objective to guide students toward the development of their individual, professional studio practices.
- The Studio program's current emphasis on studies in a single medium is overly restrictive. Providing students an ability to merge studio interests in more than one medium acknowledges current practices in the contemporary field of visual arts, where hybrid use of mediums is commonplace.
- Adding two newer art history courses to the menu of upper level art history is an overdue housekeeping gesture.

Section 4: Rationale

- **4.1** Reason for developing this proposed course: The addition of this course would enable students considering dietetics as a career to make an informed decision early in their academic endeavors. Currently, academic and professional preparation for students contemplating dietetics occurs during advising sessions and through introductory group advising sessions offered every semester by Nutrition & Dietetics faculty. In addition, offering an introductory dietetics course is common practice among universities with Dietetics programs. For example, 13 of WKU's benchmark institutions have dietetics programs, and eight of those programs have an introduction to dietetics course. Three Kentucky universities have dietetics programs (Murray, UK, and EKU) and all three have an introduction to dietetics course.
- **4.2** Relationship to similar courses offered by other WKU departments/units: It is common to have an introductory level course for majors, especially in the College of Health & Human Services. In fact, the following introductory courses are offered in CHHS: DH 100 Intro to Dental Hygiene, CD 280 Intro to CSD, EXS 223 Intro to Exercise Science, HMD 171 Intro to Management in the Hospitality Industry, REC 200 Intro to Recreation, NURS 102 Intro to Professional Nursing, and SWRK 205 Intro to Social Work. The course proposed would prepare students for admission/completion of the accredited Nutrition & Dietetics program and professional preparation, and no other course at WKU specifically addresses that.

4. Rationale for the proposed program change:

This change is being proposed to add SWRK 357 Case Management as a core required course in the BSW Program. It is currently offered as an elective. Many BSW graduates work in the field as case managers or service coordinators. This course has been approved and has been offered during Winter term sessions. The feedback from students has been very positive and many have stated they think this class has helped prepare them for practice and that every BSW student should take it. We will replace SWRK 344 with SWRK 357 in the core curriculum. However, a statistics class will still be required as an additional course required for the major. As a result, we are changing our pre-requisite from college algebra to one of the following statistics courses: SWRK 344 (which we will offer in the summer), SOCL 300, PYS/PSYS 313, PH 383, MATH 183, and STA 220 from KCTCS (to accommodate the regional campus students). This course must be completed by the end of the first semester in the major. We are also adding AFAM 190 as an Advisor Consent Elective. This course was previously approved but is no longer listed on ICAP.
